

were nothing short of devastating.

With that many young patients needing care, the Physicians for Peace team had to turn some children away. Nicola remembers one young boy, about 8 or 9, who came in for treatment, and who didn't show any fear, despite this being his first visit with a dentist. "His whole lower jaw was a mess, with both baby teeth and adult teeth all so badly decayed that we could only extract

the teeth on one side of his mouth, the side most in danger of infection or abcess."

The young boy had been brought in by his teacher, and Nicola begged her to bring him back the next day to continue his treatment. "All I can say is that I wanted to take him home with me. It's heartbreaking

Nicola's story demonstrates the dire medical need faced by Physicians for Peace around the world, and the selflessness and dedication of our volunteers. This mission was the 2nd by Physicians for Peace in the An Gaing region of Vietnam. As Nicola and the team discovered, the severe dental problems facing their young patients are often a result of children being kept on a bottle well into their 9th or 10th year, bottles filled with juice or sugarcane water. The resulting "baby bottle syndrome" rapidly decays their teeth within months. Physicians for Peace has only begun their work to keep the children of Vietnam happy, healthy and smiling.

## Walking Again in Eritrea

On a March mission to the Horn of Africa nation of Eritrea, Physicians for Peace medical volunteers continued our well-established medical education and clinical care programs there. The March mission team, led by Dr. Keith Goss, conducted foot and ankle surgeries on many young patients, as well as reconstructive surgeries for adults and young patients for foot deformities caused by genetic abnormalities, disease or accidental trauma. The mission is part of the continuing efforts of Physicians for Peace to train Eritrean surgeons in advanced surgical techniques and develop indigenous medical capacity in Eritrea and Sub-Saharan Africa.

This mission complements our overall Partnership for Eritrea initiative with The George Washington University Medical Center and the Government of Eritrea. Launched in 2005 to manage Eritrea's post-graduate medical education in pediatrics and surgery, the program will graduate its first pediatricians later this year and first surgeons in 2010. ## Healing in Honduras

In January, Garry S. Brody, M.D flew to Tegucigalpa, Honduras, at the request of Dr. Louis Gonzalez, Chief of Plastic Surgery at Médico Hospital Nacional de Honduras. Dr. Brody's mission? Conduct plastic and reconstructive surgery on patients injured by burns and other traumas, as well as provide medical education and training to hospital staff. Dr. Brody was joined by 4th year Eastern Virginia Medical School student Duffy Casey, as part of a Physicians for Peace program to send EVMS students on medical missions. Dr. Brody, working with the team of Honduran plastic surgeons, performed 17 major reconstructive surgeries for wounds suffered from causes as varied as facial cancers,

broken jaws from gun-shot wounds, severed tendons from machete wounds, an arm lost in a coffee processing machine, severe burns, and other types of trauma.

"It's amazing to see how Dr. Brody is always willing to do more, to see one more patient, to try and help one more person, regardless of how late it is, how little he's slept, or if his plane is leaving shortly," said Duffy. "This is the attitude I've found at the heart of Physicians for Peace."

EVMS medical student Nabeel Qureshi visited Santo Domingo in the Dominican

Republic in April to conduct research for the Physicians for Peace Resource Mother's Program. To address issues of domestic abuse in the region, Nabeel gathered information in English and in Spanish regarding domestic abuse, and put together a two hour workshop on domestic abuse training. He also worked to train the Resource Mothers to diagnose and treat depression, post-partum depression and domestic violence.

"Traveling to the Dominican Republic was a great experience," said Nabeel. "My eyes were opened to the conditions of people who truly are in need."
